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Introduction

Context

In the context of climate change, a growing human population, technological advancements, biodiversity decline and other trends, the decade ahead is a time for human culture to change.

The overarching challenge is to move from an exploitative relationship with our planet to a symbiotic one, both in spirit and action.

This symbiotic relationship will be realised in many ways. For example, by the rapid transition to renewable energy sources, the conscientious management of the natural environment, and the development of a culture where waste is minimised.

Aware of the vast opportunities and the need to take action, the Mount Alexander Shire Council Plan includes the goal of 'Building Sustainable Communities'.

Further, the Mount Alexander Shire Council Economic Development Plan positions the Shire as a focal point for the development of an age of 'lifestyle and sustainability'.

Purpose

The purpose of this Environment Strategy is to further define and communicate Council's strategic approach to its environmental stewardship role for the period 2015-2025.

Scope

The scope of the Environment Strategy is limited to the role of Council as a local government organisation.

Terms

In Mount Alexander Shire the terms 'sustainability' and 'environment' have often been used to distinguish between efforts focused on the built environment (sustainability) and efforts focused on the natural environment (environment).

This distinction has been helpful to clarify different roles. However, as issues such as climate change and native vegetation management require an integrated response, it is important that an inclusive term is used when discussing Council's environmental stewardship role.

'Ecologically sustainable development' (ESD) is a long-standing term, and it best defines the environmental stewardship role of Council.

ESD is defined in the *Commissioner for Environmental Sustainability Act (Victoria) 2003* as:

'Development that improves the total quality of life, both now and in the future, in a way that maintains the ecological processes on which life depends.'

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Our Land's First Custodians

Council acknowledges the Dja Dja Wurrung as the traditional owners of the lands and waters of the Mount Alexander Shire. Council also recognises all other Indigenous people of the Shire, and acknowledges the vital role that the traditional owners, the local Jaara people, played as custodians of the region.

Further, Council is committed to support reconciliation between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people in the Shire, and encourage the local Aboriginal community to work with other community members to care for the environment – in particular to impart practical knowledge of how the Aboriginal community has cared for the land for many generations.

Role of Council

Council's ESD role is targeted to ensure that, as an organisation, Council:

- Meets its statutory obligations;
- Focuses on the 'big issues' as identified in Council strategic planning documents and in Council decisions;
- Is agile and actively pursues opportunities, including external partnerships and funding opportunities;
- Takes action where it can make a difference.

Council's core ESD roles relate to:

- Effective waste management;
- Protecting biodiversity by managing native vegetation;
- Responding to climate change; and
- Being a socially responsible business.

Community Aspirations

In developing the Mount Alexander Shire Council Plan, the community was asked to identify the word it associated most with the immediate future it would like for the Shire. The word 'sustainable' topped the list by a significant margin.

In developing this Environment Strategy, the Mount Alexander Shire community was asked to select, from a list of 28 community derived options, their top five ESD priorities.

Council received 301 responses. Ranked in order the respondent's top five priority areas were:

1. The Planning Scheme recognises and protects natural assets
2. Renewable energy
3. Environmentalism and sustainability become mainstream
4. Sustainable funding and support for Landcare and other community groups
5. Innovative waste management

These five community priorities influence Council's environmental stewardship role.

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Strategy

Vision

A Shire of sustainability, with healthy ecosystems in a rural/bush land environment and emitting zero nett carbon emissions.

A Council with a strong reputation for its environmental commitments and partnerships, acknowledged as a leader in local rural sustainable development nationally and internationally.

A community aware, proud and active in caring for the environment and living sustainably, where land owners and managers actively protect biodiversity, are strongly engaged and are supported by Council actions in natural environment, sustainability and waste management.

This vision has continued on from the Mount Alexander Environment Strategy 2011-2014. It speaks to the need for Council and the community to collaborate to create low carbon, low waste communities, in healthy natural ecosystems.

Functions

Council's vision will be realised in three ways:

1. Positions
2. Programs
3. Partnerships



These three functions support each other.

Clear **positions** articulate Council's stance and approach to ESD.

Well-considered **programs** address Council's core ESD roles.

Collaborative **partnerships** enable greater achievements.

Positions

Priority Area 1: **Council leadership by example**

Council can show leadership in making environmentalism and sustainability mainstream in Mount Alexander Shire.

Council leadership can be expressed in many ways. For example, evidence-based policy statements regarding issues such as climate change, cost effective and appropriate eco-technologies such as LED streetlights, and using Council's unique statutory responsibilities to further ESD aims e.g. rate rebates for properties with a conservation covenant in place.

Positions

Priority Area 2: **Ecologically Sustainable Development team as a corporate resource**

Improving the sustainability and environment of the Shire is the work and responsibility of all parts of Council.

This Priority Area formalises the advisory role of the ESD team to ensure that all the projects and services of Council fully consider waste, the natural environment, and climate change.

Providing early and ongoing internal ESD advice will assist in reducing risks and long-term costs. For instance, the design of a new, or the refurbishment of an existing significant infrastructure asset, may change when climate change projections for the municipality are fully considered.

When required, the ESD team will be the contact point to engage outside consultants with specialist expertise.

Priority Area 3: **Reduce resource consumption across Council**

Council routinely seeks to minimise resource consumption in the delivery what we do and what we build. These efforts are ongoing.

A major focus for Council is to further improve its sustainable procurement practices. Sustainable procurement is about reducing the adverse, and increasing the beneficial, environmental, social and economic impacts of the products and services Council purchases and the way in which we use them.

The first stage in sustainable procurement is to determine if the purchase or use of the good or service is really needed, and if so, if there are alternatives to purchasing new goods.

Programs

Priority Area 4: **Improve waste management and resource recovery facilities and services**

Council provides kerbside rubbish and recycling collection, public litter collection, and two public transfer stations. Waste management facilities are located at Castlemaine and Maldon.

As a core Council service, it is vital to continually innovate and improve the delivery of waste and resource recovery within the Mount Alexander Shire. To this end, Council continues to examine its waste operations and research new and improved approaches.

Moving towards zero waste will require generating less waste from our activities, increasing the sustainable recovery of material for recycling and reprocessing, and reducing the damage to the environment created by waste disposal.

Priority Area 5: **Protect and manage priority natural environment assets**

Natural environment assets are places recognised as having high environmental value at a national, state, regional or local level. They provide a range of benefits to society – clean air and water, the control of pests, fertile soils, climate regulation and open space.

Mount Alexander has a diverse range of natural environment assets which occur across the range of land tenures.

Council has the lead management role for a diverse land portfolio, including municipal controlled roadsides, urban waterways, recreation reserves, disused gravel reserves, and old landfill sites. Across this portfolio many varied types and qualities of natural environment assets can be found. Council's focus will remain on protecting and enhancing high quality assets.

On private land many notable high quality assets also exist. Council, through its application of the state planning scheme, and through its rate and compliance functions, will seek to protect these high quality assets.

Priority Area 6: **Integrate our response to climate change**

Council, in considering the impact of climate change on its operations, is moving towards an integrated response. Climate change projections will become part of all strategic deliberations.

One of the most important climate change responses across society is to start using clean renewable energy, and to keep using it. Council will actively transition to renewable energy across its operations including transport. Reducing greenhouse gas emissions from Council's landfill will also be a key focus.

Priority Area 7: **Enable the community to take action**

Enabling the community to take action is an important aspect of Council's role as it allows ESD to be achieved at a greater rate.

Council provides free sustainable living education through workshops and information. It also provides direct financial assistance, for example, through community grants.

Council enables the community in many other ways too, for example through the development of memoranda of understanding with key ESD groups, and through local and regional collaborations.

Importantly, Council advocates for State and Commonwealth Government funding to realise the community desire for sustainable communities in a healthy natural environment.
